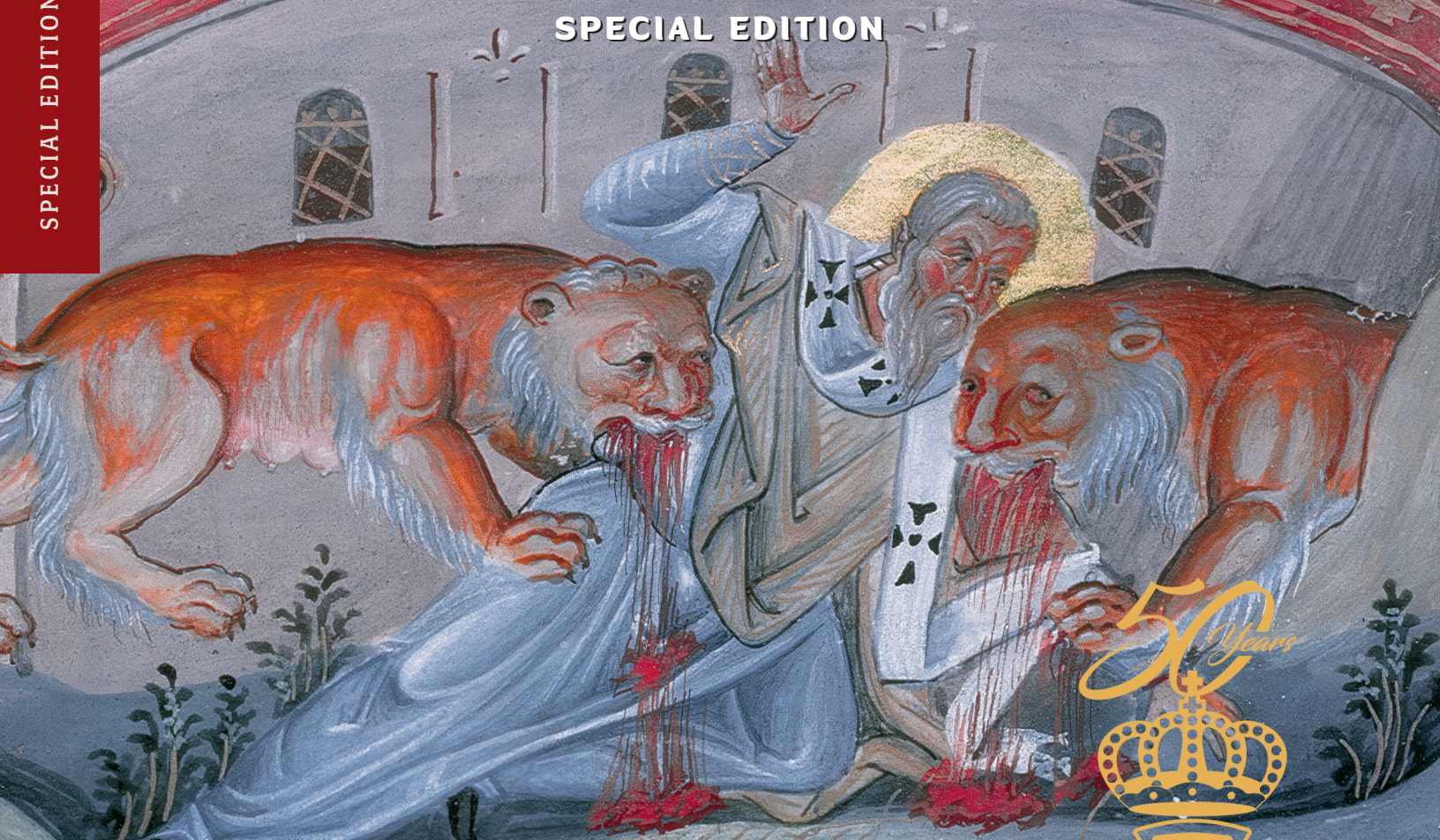

Your Eminence Metropolitan SABA, Brother Hierarchs, Esteemed Members of The Order of St. Ignatius of Antioch, and my Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

May God grant you many years!

St. Ignatius in his Epistle to the Ephesians reminds us of the following:

“The tree is made manifest by its fruit; so those that profess themselves to be Christians shall be recognized by their conduct. For there is not now a demand for mere profession, but that a man be found continuing in the power of faith to the end.”(Epistle to the Ephesians, Chapter 14)

First, let me begin by congratulating all of the members of The Order on the occasion of the 50th Anniversary of its establishment. We are very grateful to the members of The Order for their dedication to this archdiocese. The Order has offered scholarships to our young people. Let us take up our cross and follow our Lord joyfully and ask the intercession of our patron, St. Ignatius, that the work that is given to us may be received and enacted with great joy. Unworthily I ask for your holy prayers. It is my honor to serve as your Spiritual Advisor.

Order in Action

St. Elias Church, Syracuse

On April 19, 2026, members of The Order partnered with the Young Adult Ministry (YAM) and parishioners at St. Elias Church in Syracuse, NY, to pack pantry food items for 96 families of the City of Syracuse School District.

This was no ordinary act of charity. It was the Church breathing as one. As St. Ignatius himself wrote: “Where the bishop is, there let the multitude of believers be; even as where Jesus Christ is, there is the Catholic Church.” In that same spirit, when the hands of The Order, the hearts of the young adults, and the faithfulness of the wider parish joined together, the whole Body of Christ was present in that room.

In what has become a beloved annual tradition, parishioners at Sts. Peter and Paul Antiochian Orthodox Church in Potomac, MD, gathered after Liturgy on March 16, 2026, to pack enough meals to feed 25,000 of our neighbors in need. Led by Order of St. Ignatius Members Serene Jweied and Sarah Shames, over 100 parishioners of all ages spent about three hours carefully measuring and packing ready-to-cook packets of food.



St. Ignatius of Antioch

The Patron Saint of the Order of St. Ignatius of Antioch

The Hieromartyr Ignatius the God-Bearer was a disciple of the holy Apostle and Evangelist John the Theologian, as was also St. Polycarp, Bishop of Smyrna. St. Ignatius was the second bishop of Antioch, and successor to Bishop Euodius, Apostle of the Seventy.

Tradition suggests that when St. Ignatius was a little boy, the Savior hugged him and said: “unless you turn and become as little children you shall not enter into the Kingdom of Heaven”(Mt.18:3). The St. was called God-bearer (Theophorous), because

he bore God in his heart and prayed unceasingly to Him. He also had this name because he was held in the arms of Christ, the incarnate Son of God.

St. Ignatius was a disciple of the Apostle John the Theologian, together with St. Polycarp of Smyrna. As Bishop of Antioch, St. Ignatius was zealous and spared no effort to build up the church of Christ. To him is attributed the practice of antiphonal singing (by two choirs) during church services. He had seen a vision of the angels in heaven alternately singing praises to God, and divided his church choir to follow



this example. In the time of persecution he was a source of strength to the souls of his flock, and was eager to suffer for Christ.

In the year 106 the emperor Trajan (98-117), after his victory over the Scythians, ordered everyone to give thanks to the pagan gods, and to put to death any Christians who refused to worship the idols. In the year 107, Trajan happened to pass through Antioch. Here they told him that Bishop Ignatius openly confessed Christ, and taught people to scorn riches, to lead a virtuous life, and preserve their virginity. St. Ignatius came voluntarily before the emperor, so as to avert persecution of the Christians in Antioch. St. Ignatius rejected the persistent requests of the emperor Trajan to sacrifice to the idols. The emperor then decided to send him to Rome to be thrown to the wild beasts. St. Ignatius joyfully accepted the sentence imposed upon him. His readiness for martyrdom was attested to by eyewitnesses, who accompanied St. Ignatius from Antioch to Rome.

On the way to Rome, the ship sailed from Seleucia and stopped at Smyrna, where St. Ignatius met with his friend Bishop Polycarp. Clergy and believers from other cities and towns thronged to see St. Ignatius. He exhorted everyone not to fear death and not to grieve for him. In his Epistle to the Roman Christians, he asked them to assist him with their prayers, and to pray that God would strengthen him in his impending martyrdom for Christ: "I seek Him Who died for us; I desire Him Who rose for our salvation... In me, desire has been nailed to the cross, and no flame of material longing is left. Only the living water speaks within me, saying, Hasten to the Father."

From Smyrna, St. Ignatius went to Troas. Here he

heard the happy news of the end of the persecution against Christians in Antioch. From Troas, St. Ignatius sailed to Neapolis (in Macedonia) and then to Philippi.

On the way to Rome St. Ignatius visited several churches, teaching and guiding the Christians there. He also wrote seven epistles: to the churches of Ephesus, Magnesia, Tralles, Rome, Philadelphia, and Smyrna. He also addressed a letter to St. Polycarp, who mentions a collection of the letters of St. Ignatius in his letter to the Philippians (Ch. 13). St. Irenaeus of Lyons quotes from St. Ignatius's letter to the Romans (Against Heresies 5:28:4). All these letters have survived to the present day.



THE HISTORY OF

The Order of St. Ignatius of Antioch

A small committee was organized under the Chairmanship of Albert Joseph and was composed of Ernest Saykaly, Robert Andrews, Robert Laham, Theodore Mackoul, Archpriest Paul Schneirla, and Archpriest Anthony Gabriel. During the Archdiocese Convention held in Louisville, KY, in July 1975, a preliminary report was filed at the General Assembly. The Metropolitan accepted the findings of the report and by the Archdiocese Convention held in 1976 in San Francisco, CA, the provisional Chairman, Albert Joseph, was installed and the first inductions to The Order took place.

It was during the Patriarch's historic trip that the newest Archdiocesan organization was called into being and was given his Apostolic blessings. The first officers and chaplain were formally installed and many new members were inducted at the Washington Archdiocesan conclave in 1977. Ever since His Beatitude Patriarch ELIAS IV of thrice-blessed memory and our beloved primate Metropolitan PHILIP formally blessed and inaugurated The Order of St. Ignatius of Antioch, an unprecedented number of lay persons were awakened to their global Archdiocesan

responsibilities and scores of earnest women and men have come forward to join The Order.

Our Mission

Rooted in our Lord, God and Savior, Jesus Christ and inspired by St. Ignatius of Antioch, the second-century bishop and martyr, The Order cultivates unconditional love and generosity of spirit by engaging all Antiochian Orthodox Christian faithful in the work of the Archdiocese. The Order is devoted to charitable acts and financial support for youth, clergy, seminarians, and our neighbors in need.

A LIFE-CHANGING EXPERIENCE

For where your treasure is, there will be your heart also (Luke 12:34)

What follows is a personal tribute to our hearts. What would you do when faced with a life-changing experience? I faced a life-changing experience back in 2021 with a severe case of Covid. I was within 4 hours of my death and hospitalized for 100 days on a ventilator. I am alive today by the Grace and Mercy of God. I am a different person today.

However, it was minor compared to the life-changing experience of serving as Chair for The Order of St. Ignatius of Antioch. I was first called to serve as Membership Co-Chair, then Membership Chair, Vice-Chair, and eventually Chair. This was over a span of 20 years. Never did I expect to be called to serve as Chair, but accepted the challenge knowing full well the sacrifice it would require. I visited more parishes than I can recall. Each visit I would introduce myself and explain the good works of The Order. The nearly universal response was, “I thought I had to be invited.” Christ planted a seed within me to meet this challenge directly. On my next visit I introduced myself and proceeded to invite the individual to join. Our membership grew exponentially.

Sacrifice came with extensive travel, many banquets, presentations, articles (no internet back then!) for publication, but, most importantly, the joy of welcoming new members into The Order. Sacrifice was more like a deep passion for serving Christ and His Church. I felt it in my bones.

The Order is celebrating 50 years. The dream and vision of His Eminence Metropolitan PHILIP for an organization of dedicated Antiochians to serve and support our Archdiocese as well as supporting projects that furthered the vision of Orthodoxy itself. A well-known fundraising consultant said, “If you want to change the world, you need to pay for it.” This is the vision of The Order.



The world is in dire need of Christ. Each of us must become Christ-like and one way we do so by our support of The Order. Something happens to us spiritually when we commit ourselves to serving Christ through The Order. We learn compassion, gratitude, and service. I have personally witnessed individuals who joined The Order and became ardent supporters of their local parish. The zeal to serve our Lord which had been bottled up inside of us, flourishes to bring change to our fallen world. When we care for our church, when we send our children to camp, when we insure a strong church school, when we care for our clergy, when we are proper and good stewards, we are transformed

My travels brought many new friends who chose to follow my leadership as well as the Chairs who came before and after me. When we become friends, we choose to stand side by side in our service and this unity of faith increases our numbers and increases the good we can accomplish.

When you give to the poor it is like lending to the Lord and he will pay you back. Just think, the Lord guarantees the “loan” you make to the poor. There is no more secure loan on earth than this. Yet, why are we hesitant to take up the Lord on his offer? Maybe we don’t realize that he has already paid us back.

Henri Nouwen, well-known author on generosity explains about the spirit of thanksgiving: “Gratitude goes beyond the “mine” and “thine” and claims the truth that all of life is a pure gift. In the past I always thought of gratitude as a spontaneous response to the awareness of gifts received, but now I realize that gratitude can also

be lived as a discipline. The discipline of gratitude is the explicit effort to acknowledge that all I am and have is given to me as a gift of love, a gift to be celebrated with joy.”

I was blessed to serve as Chair, but everyone is called to serve the purpose God has in store for each of us. Supporting The Order is one way to fulfill the purpose the Lord has set for you. Don’t let it slip away for God loves a cheerful giver. Be a cheerful giver and enjoy the personal reward of giving generously. When we give generously from the heart, we soon learn that the more we give, the more God gives us to give even more. We never run out of money

A pig and a chicken were planning a birthday party for Farmer Brown. “And what do you suggest that we do for Farmer Brown?” asked the pig. The chicken replied, “I was thinking of making him a ham and egg breakfast.” The pig, troubled by this idea, quietly said to the chicken, “For you this is a contribution, but for me it’s a total commitment.” God does not ask us for a contribution, because his Church is not a club to which we pay dues. He is asking for a total commitment-our life!

50 years has passed like a flash of lightning. The Order has built a foundation to support another 50 years. The generations that follow us will be able to experience joyful giving by immersing themselves in The Order of St. Ignatius of Antioch through its good works.

Metropolitan PHILIP once said, “Blessed are those who give without remembering and blessed are those who receive without forgetting.” What you are is God’s gift to you. What you do with it is your gift to God.

The same relationship can be said for The Order of St. Ignatius and our camping programs in the Antiochian Archdiocese.

For decades, The Order has supported our camping programs with millions of dollars of camper scholarships, making it possible for thousands of young people to attend camp, who otherwise would not be able to do so. Every year, at least 1 in 4 campers receive some sort of financial assistance from parishes, private donors, and especially from The Order of St. Ignatius.

Camp has been a huge part of my entire life. In fact, I exist because of Camp. My parents met at the Antiochian Village, I was a lifelong camper, CIT, and summer staff member, and I have had the blessing to serve in a year-round capacity at The Village for many years. So much of who I am—my relationship with Christ, the relationships I have developed throughout my life—are a result of my time at The Village. Going to camp every summer



was a highlight of my year as I knew I would be in a safe Christ-centered environment, surrounded by brothers and sisters, as we all strove to strengthen our relationship with Christ.

Thousands of people get to experience this transformative and nurturing ministry every year, and our camps continue to grow and expand. We are now blessed to have 11 camping programs in our Archdiocese, many of which offer more than just summer camp, including winter camps, family camps, adult camp, Arch Week and Bridge week, alumni reunions—and the number of programs continues to grow! Camping is a ministry that our Archdiocese does very well, thanks to the staff and volunteers who run the programs, the leadership of Khalil Samara and the Department of Camping,

the support of our hierarchs, clergy, parishes, and Board of Trustees, and especially by the consistent support of The Order of St. Ignatius.

Of course, The Order offers necessary funds to enable campers to attend camp. But more important than any amount of money, the prayers from the members of The Order, and the fact that The Order members talk about and promote Camp wherever they go, enable our camping programs to continue doing the important ministry that they do, offering an environment for all those who attend to grow closer to Christ.

Jesus Christ Himself is the one who does all the work at Camp and in the Church. The Order makes it possible for so many to get to Camp so Christ can do that important work, transforming our hearts, minds, and souls. For that, I and so many others are eternally grateful. This year marks the 50th anniversary of The Order of St. Ignatius, the philanthropic arm of the Antiochian Orthodox Christian Archdiocese of North America. It is a moment not only to celebrate the achievements of The Order, but also to reflect on the spirit of faith, generosity, and service that has sustained it for half a century.

My own journey with The Order began in 1985, when I joined as a knight. At that time, I did not imagine that my involvement would become such a central part of my life in the Church. Over the years, I have had the privilege of serving on the Governing Council continuously, holding every position except Secretary, and eventually being entrusted with the role of Chair in 1998. I continue to serve on the Governing Council to this date.



My decision to deepen my commitment to The Order—by upgrading my membership and dedicating myself to its leadership—was motivated by a simple but powerful realization. I had become aware of how little we were able to provide for our retired clergy. The men who had devoted their lives to serving the Church deserved far more than the modest allowance they were receiving. I remember feeling a sense of embarrassment that we, as a community, could not do better for those that had given so much.

Over the years, The Order has provided essential support for many vital initiatives: assisting our clergy, granting camp scholarships for our youth, and strengthening the ministries that nurture the spiritual life of our faithful. These efforts are not simply charitable works—they are expressions of our commitment to the life of the Church and the future of Orthodoxy in North America.

As we celebrate 50 years, we also look forward. The needs of our Archdiocese continue to grow; the work of The Order remains as important today as it was at its founding. Our clergy still need our support, our youth still need guidance and opportunity, and our ministries continue to rely on the generosity and dedication of the faithful.

The past 50 years have demonstrated what can be accomplished when people unite around a common purpose rooted in faith. The next 50 years will require the same spirit of commitment and generosity.

It has been one of the greatest honors of my life to serve The Order of St. Ignatius and the Antiochian Archdiocese. I am grateful for the opportunity to

work alongside so many dedicated individuals who believe deeply in the mission of the Church.

The THREE Tenets of The Order of St. Ignatius of Antioch

Act of Faith

Rooted in Love & Compassion

As early as 1974, Metropolitan PHILIP Saliba, of thrice-blessed memory, had a vision that an organization of the laity could provide the means by which the Antiochian Orthodox Christian Archdiocese could magnify and multiply its ministry. He assembled a committee of dedicated and generous lay leaders to organize such an organization including Albert Joseph, Ernest Saykaly, Robert Andrews, Robert Laham, Theodore Mackoul, and Fathers Paul Schneirla and Anthony Gabriel, all of who have departed this life in the hope of the Resurrection.

That committee submitted its report to the Archdiocese Convention in Louisville, KY, in 1975 which enthusiastically approved the establishment of The Order of St. Ignatius of Antioch. The first inductions into The Order occurred, and the first officers were installed, at the following Archdiocese Convention in San Francisco in 1976, 50 years ago. Among the highest priorities of The Order was the care of and support for the clergy of the Archdiocese. Prior to this time there was virtually no provision for a retirement plan for priests or their wives, many of whom had faithfully and sacrificially served the Church for most of their adult lives.

The first steps toward a retirement plan became possible through a grant from The Order of St. Ignatius. Priests would accrue a “housing allowance” in retirement based on the length of time they had served in the Archdiocese. Over the years it became possible for a retired priest to receive a maximum of \$800/month in retirement, and his widow would continue to receive 75% of his allowance. It was widely recognized that this allowance was inadequate,



but it was a beginning. It was also recognized that the Retired Clergy Housing Allowance Fund was insufficient to meet the need.

The Archdiocese was growing quickly, the number of priests was increasing, and the cost of living was diminishing the value of the housing allowance; therefore, a new system was necessary. The Order again stepped forward, and since 2013 has provided the means by which each priest would control his own retirement account, funded in three parts: by his contributions, by a matching gift from his parish, and by a grant from the Archdiocese through an annual subsidy from The Order. As a result, the clergy of the Archdiocese now control in excess of \$17 million in retirement savings.

The Order supports many ministries in the Archdiocese. Indeed, the Antiochian Village and our other camps would not exist without the support of The Order. Nor would the departments of Missions and Evangelism, Youth Ministry,

Campus Ministry, Theological Education, Religious Education, or so many other worthy initiatives; however, as an illustrious member of our Board of Trustees has observed, if we do not take care of our clergy, nothing else works.

The clergy and their families are deeply grateful to The Order and its members for their continuing and generous support. We clergy encourage everyone who has the means to do so to join The Order. We also recognize that it is both incumbent upon us and in our interests to identify, cultivate, and support new members of The Order at all levels of giving, and to encourage current members to upgrade their memberships.

Metropolitan PHILIP and the founders of The Order had a vision which has endured for 50 years. Metropolitan SABA continues to build on the foundation he has inherited. May God continue to bless and inspire The Order through the Holy Spirit for the next 50 years or until the Lord Himself returns.

Fifty years of commitment and generosity by the wonderful people in our God-protected Archdiocese have enabled the Archdiocese and the members of The Order of St. Ignatius of Antioch to ease suffering, improve the quality of many lives, spread the word of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, and make a difference in our world.

Through the spiritual commitment and generosity of those who have made a lifetime commitment to The Order, The Order has, in addition to its financial support of our Archdiocese, our camping program through improvements to our camps and scholarships to our children and contributions to the retirement of our clergy, supported numerous grants The Order has received from members of our Archdiocese, the Departments of our Archdiocese as well as other Orthodox Christians.

The Order receives grant applications on an annual basis, which are reviewed by The Order's grant committee. The grant committee provides its recommendations to The Order's executive board, the governing council. The governing council reviews the grants and those grants that it approves are forwarded to the Metropolitan Archbishop, Metropolitan SABA, for review and approval. No grant is funded without the Metropolitan Archbishop's approval.

Over the years, The Order has funded hundreds of thousands of dollars in individual grants. Those grants include funds for:

- The Treehouse in Wichita, KS, which provides to new mothers and babies basic necessities, education, and personal care.
- Focus North America, which exists to serve the poor by bringing together Orthodox Christian churches and community partnerships to provide food, clothing, shelter, and understanding to address the needs of the people in those communities.
- Various Orthodox Schools that provide classical education.
- Project Mexico and St. Innocent Orphanage, a not-for-profit organization that transforms lives by



service, shelter, and faith. Project Mexico has built over 450 homes for impacted families in Mexico.

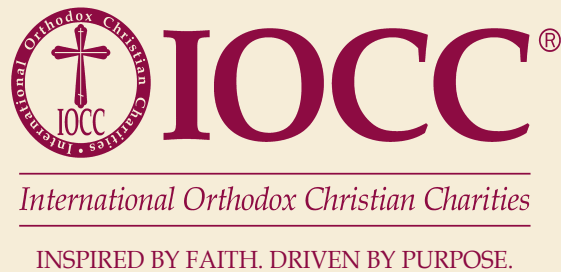
- Orthodox Volunteer Corp., which was created to develop and equip Orthodox young adults to lead lives of faithful service by serving the most vulnerable, cultivating community, engaging in the church, and leadership through faith.
- International Orthodox Christian Charities, which provides emergency relief and development programs to those in need worldwide.

This is only a small sample of the individual grants funded by The Order.

The grant application process gives the members of our Archdiocese the ability to seek funds for innovative projects, which promote Orthodoxy, philanthropy, and service to others.

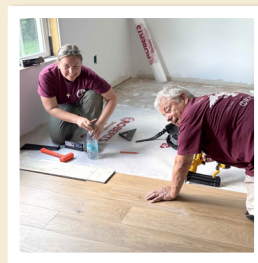
As our patron saint, St. Ignatius of Antioch told us, “We recognize a tree by its fruit, and we ought to be able to recognize a Christian by his action . . .”

Since 1988, Project Mexico & St. Innocent Orphanage has answered Christ's call to serve the least, the last, and the lost. As a 501(c)(3) Orthodox Christian nonprofit, the ministry has built over 450 homes for impoverished families in Mexico, engaged more than 17,000 volunteers, and provided loving care, education, and spiritual formation to orphaned children at the only Orthodox orphanages in the Americas:

Building Homes

In the communities surrounding Tijuana, approximately 2.2 million resident homes are below the national poverty line. Since 1988, Project



Mexico & St. Innocent Orphanage has constructed hundreds of weather-tight, secure homes—built entirely by volunteers. These homes provide more than shelter. They offer stability, dignity, and a fresh start.

Transforming Young Lives

A Home for Boys Without Families: St. Innocent Orphanage has cared for orphaned teenage boys since 1996. Why only boys? According to statistics, it's estimated that 75-80% of adoptive parents prefer to adopt girls both domestically and internationally. Boys receive spiritual formation rooted in the life of the Church, academic tutoring alongside their public schooling, vocational training, athletics, and—perhaps most importantly—the consistent love of staff and volunteers who show up season after season.

North America's Only Orthodox Infant Orphanage

In 2024 Project Mexico has broken new ground with Casa Cuna—the only Orthodox infant orphanage on the continent. Casa Cuna currently receives and cares for infants and toddlers. Here, every child is held, nurtured, and welcomed into a community shaped by Orthodox faith—because every child bears the image of God.

Serving Christ

None of this happens alone.

The sustained generosity of The Order of St. Ignatius has been a profound gift to our mission. Their support reflects a shared conviction that faith must move beyond the walls of the church and into the lives of those who need it most. Serving the Antiochian Orthodox Christian Archdiocese through The Order of St. Ignatius has been one of the great privileges of my life. When I was asked to serve as North American Chairperson, I understood the role would require time, diligence, and steady leadership but I did not fully grasp how deeply the experience would shape my heart, my sense of stewardship, and my gratitude and admiration for the faithful people who make this ministry possible. 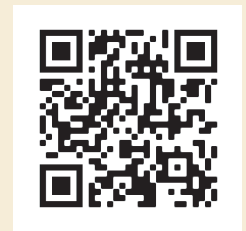
